Concept: Adopt sustainability practices to avoid legacy sites



 - NGOs








- Purpose: foster and implement sustainable options for uranium production


- Broaden definition of sustainability to include legacy sites
- Strong misperceptions persist regarding ISR
- More IFSOUP meetings are desired to build dialog and information exchange
- "manini" (small stuff") translate to local language
- Industry and Tribes cooperate on policies/legislation such as compensation acts,
 Bingham, mining law reform, sacred sites, and/or funding for legacy reclamation)
- Tribal leaders should take the lead in representing tribal interests in international meetings
- Health is holistic to Tribes, not only HP matter includes mental health, sense of wellbeing, and health of natural environment.
- Mining development may be improperly assigned blame if pre-existing community tensions erupt
- Mining moratoria exist on reservations in N America (ie Navajo), US States (ie Virginia), and elsewhere
- Tribes may set standards for monitoring or reclamation
- Sean Wille member on Dine nation and HR manager with Cameco noted that jobs creation is the most important element of CSR. 3 generation model (children see parents going to work in trades; children become educated professionals and managers; their children become owners and operators of Tribal resource projects)
- Cultural respect could be demonstrated by repatriation of cultural goods

Actions

- IFSOUP and IIIRM to hold a meeting focused on Corporate Social
- Responsibility in development of human capital and workforce for mine reclamation projects.
- IFSOUP to hold meetings in Texas and Wyoming for growing knowledge about ISR technology, reuse (Cameco, Areva), and closure.
- IFSOUP meeting with DOE and NRC to learn about nuclear fuel cycle, especially recycling, in a more holistic, tribally-oriented manner.
- Navajo leaders desire meetings with industry and DOE to explore more support for reclamation on Tribal land.

New Resource: ICMM position statement was developed to guide companies in interactions with indigenous peoples .
